Several years ago when a group of members at the congregation I was serving did a series of congregation-wide listening sessions on mental health, we discovered the pervasiveness of mental illness. It affected nearly every family we talked to. I vowed then that wherever I am serving as pastor, we will be upfront, straightforward, honest, and vulnerable about mental health. In order to open the conversation, shortly after my arrival at Shepherd of the Bay, we did a Sunday morning book study of *Troubled Minds*, by Amy Simpson, a book dealing with mental health and how the church might be active in ministry to those who are suffering. It's important to break the silence around mental illness and to erase the shame that is often directed at those who suffer from depression or any of the multitude of ways in which mental illness manifests itself. We don't seem to have a problem talking about cardiac illness or cancer, or the multitude of other illnesses of our bodies. It should be no different when talking about illnesses that are centered in our brain.

I've been very public about the fact that both my parents suffered from depression, my mom's depression diagnosed, and my dad's not. I have a sister who suffers from bipolar disorder. And my family is not unique. When I ask people about it, nearly everyone I talk to can quickly name a family member or friend who suffers from mental illness. In the US, experts estimate that 25% of the adult population suffers from some form of mental illness. Occasionally through my adult life, I have found myself sinking into a hole and have needed some help. I have found that a period of time with a counselor has been really useful for me. Late in the summer, I returned to a regular time of therapy. I can't tell you what a godsend that time has been.

I'm bringing up this matter of mental illness now because I know these are challenging times for all of us. Mental health experts are concerned about the effect this pandemic is having on our collective mental health, what the long-term effects might be, and how we might help each other.

This past weekend, it became very personal. I learned of the death by suicide of two young people from families who are important to me. One was the son of a friend and colleague. The young man was 27 years old and had just passed his medical boards after 4 years of stellar marks in medical school. The other was a sophomore in high school from a family in my last parish. She was one of those kids who came up front every Sunday for the children's message, shepherding her younger siblings along with her. It's hard to comprehend; I can't make sense of it.

These are difficult days. It's important for us to be honest with ourselves and with those around us about how we're doing and to reach out when we need help. I've been paying attention to mental health experts since this pandemic began, doing my best to try to understand the impact that it's having on me, on members of Shepherd of the Bay, and the larger community. There are some themes that have emerged.

Dealing with the constant effects of the pandemic is causing a low-grade trauma for all of us. No matter how we try to spin it, there are fears that never go away. The ongoing uncertainty takes its toll. Remember when we first went under lockdown and we thought it might be a few weeks? Then we thought a few months? The news came last week that orchestras around the country are cancelling their entire 2020-2021 seasons. A professional conference that I attend every other year has cancelled the conference for next summer. One of the things that makes it hard is that any end to the pandemic is completely uncertain. Constant low-grade trauma causes us to feel tired and can cause blue feelings, even feelings of hopelessness. The experts are saying that this is normal.

One of the most difficult parts of the pandemic is the isolation that many of us are feeling. So many of the ways that we used to have contact with each other are not possible or carry a greater risk that we are willing to take. The isolation is hard. So, it's important to reach out and make contact with other humans. Zoom meetings are not ideal, but they are a way to have conversation with others. You might rather visit with a friend in person, but by phone or FaceTime is an important substitute in these days of isolation. Here at Shepherd of the Bay, we have discovered that even coming to church and sitting in your car in the parking lot is a way to make some connections with others.

I'll share with you one of suggestions my therapist shared with me. In this time when so much seems so heavy, find little things to do several times a day that bring a feeling of pleasure or delight, something that fosters a moment of joy. It doesn't have to be a big thing. Maybe it's a few moments of reading, a short walk down the street and back, a moment of quiet with a cup of tea. The key here is to take breaks throughout the day to do something that makes us feel good.

I would also encourage an active practice of gratitude. Spend a few minutes every day thinking about what you are grateful for. There are so many small, unnoticed things in our lives that make life rich. The electricity that gives us light in the evening, the taste or texture of your favorite food, the soft cozy feeling of your favorite chair, the delight of hearing the voice of someone you love. I know some people who have taken up the discipline of keeping a gratitude journal, promising to themselves that every day, they will write down a given number of things for which they are thankful that day. I think it's a good spiritual practice to cultivate.

Finally, I want you to promise me that if you are ever at that place where you feel like you are at the end of your rope, that you will call me or someone else that you love. Let us know that you need help. Life is never meant to be faced alone, and especially in these difficult and challenging days, we can't do it alone. We need fellow pilgrims on the journey. If you need me, I promise to be here.

Even in the midst of these challenging times – or maybe <u>especially</u> in these challenging times – I consider it a blessing to be serving with you in this fabulous congregation. Thank you for all you do.

These fully-prepared dinners will be available for non-contact pick-up on Wednesday, November 25, at either of two locations: First Baptist Church in Sister Bay, or Bethel Baptist Church in Ellison Bay. Pick-up times at both locations are from 3:30 to 5:30 pm. Meals may also be delivered upon request. Advance reservations are essential.

This effort is an outreach to Northern Door individuals, couples, or families who may be dealing with health concerns, financial difficulties, or problems related to mobility or isolation. This year has been especially stressful for many, and the sponsoring churches hope to brighten the holiday for those on the receiving end.

To reserve your Thanksgiving meal or meals, please visit <u>fb.me/northerndoortday</u> and click the sign up button. Reservations will be taken through Nov. 13th. If the maximum number that can be accommodated is reached, you will be notified and placed on a wait list.

If you prefer, you may make your reservation by telephoning the office of First Baptist Church, Sister Bay. (920-854-2544, ext. 10). When leaving a message, please include your full name, the number of meals requested, and a phone number at which you can be reached to confirm your reservation.

The traditional Thanksgiving menu will feature roasted turkey (both white and dark meat), sage and apple stuffing, cranberry sauce, mashed potatoes, pan gravy, candied yams, green beans, Waldorf salad, dinner rolls and pumpkin pie. Meals must be refrigerated when received and will come with instructions for reheating.

This particular year may be different for most of us. Gathering together may not be possible nor prudent. Health concerns, not just the expected over-eating on this festive day, may outweigh the strong interest to maintain our favorite traditions. We must focus on the Light of the World to banish the darkness of personal disappointment and loss.

This year, the Sunday after Thanksgiving, still in the short month of November, we will celebrate the First Sunday of Advent and the first candle will be lit on the Advent Wreath. # DEVOTIONAL FOR LANDSCAPE MINISTRY

You may wonder why we call our work in the Gardens of St. Andrews a ministry. Here's why it's a significant ministry, and why it's one of my passions in life.

The Christian Church is called upon to rise to the challenges of every age. In the present age one of the most critical issues is protecting and restoring God's creation (the earth) from the devastation caused by human activity. For Christians, caring for the earth is not an "environmental cause", but a holy calling.

When we begin our conversations with God by thanking Him for the creation, we recognize the earth and all that is in it as the foundation for all of life. And through this intimate relationship with God as creator, we're invited to interact not just with one another, but with all aspects of God's creation. Perhaps that's why I've always felt closest to God in wilderness settings.

God's creation of the universe wasn't just a single "big bang" moment in the past. God works continuously and is present in all of creation. As Martin Luther wrote, "God is present in every planet and every leaf". The psalmist wrote "the earth, O Lord, is full of your steadfast love" (Psalm 119: 64).

We often assume that the earth belongs to us and we can do anything we want with it. Instead, it is we who belong to the earth and in God's creation. As part of God's creation we have a special role in caring for each and every part of it. Our Landscape Ministry at St. Andrews isn't just a community garden club that pulls weeds and makes pretty gardens. It is truly a ministry of Christians who love nature, love the fellowship of working together, and care about God's creation. For me, personally, the Gardens of St. Andrews are a greater embodiment of God's creation than church buildings. I feel close to God, for example, when I'm working or just resting in the Meditation Garden where dozens of former church members' ashes lay. I also cherish those times when, as a group, we pause for prayer after a morning's work. And we get the greatest joy when a member or a neighbor tells us they come to the gardens to pray for hope, to meditate, or to remember a loved one.

Let us all pray for the earth and all that is in it. Amen.


### **Projects**

- •Interior LED Lights Work began Monday October 5<sup>th</sup> in the Fellowship Hall with Joel Thomas, Scott Eckdahl, Mark Glasser, Glenn Rossman and Tom Tuttle. New fixtures have now been installed in the Fellowship Hall, Nursery, Church office, Nurse's office, Music Director's office and Choir Room. Work will continue on Monday mornings until the work is complete.
- •Exterior LED Lights Action Electric has had a recent closure due to COVID 19 and is just getting back to work, their quote should be received soon.
- •Sanctuary Dimmers This project has been put on hold due to the financial uncertainty of the COVID19 outbreak and will be revisited this month with the Council.
- •Brush Removal The brush along the highway is being cleared so that the church can be seen by travelers heading north. A short section along the highway starting at the south edge

of the mowed lawn and heading south has been cleared. The brush will be left where it is cut down until all work is completed. Work will continue south to the property line at Porcupine Bay Rd as weather permits and manpower is available.

•Zion Church Stained-Glass – Restoration of the window and installation was completed on Friday, October 2. Cracks in 4 sections of the window were found. They were left "as is" since duplicating the artwork would have been extremely time consuming and expensive. The window is once again lit at night in the top of the west side of the Portico.

•**High speed Internet** – Spectrum has completed their wiring over the highway and should be running the cable to the building by the end of October. Installation should be complete in early November.



years old and at the end of its useful life. The Committee is investigating the purchase of a compact utility tractor with a mower deck and a front loader. The loader will allow the Garden Club to easily move dirt in the Spring, eliminating the use of shovels and wheel barrels. Future attachments could include a snowblower or plow and various attachments for landscaping.

**Electric Space Heaters** – Two of the current forced air space heaters will be replaced with new electric radiator type units that are more efficient. The units have a modern sleek flat panel appearance, have a low surface temperature of 90deg F, and are very efficient. One has replaced the heater in the west stairwell which had been working intermittently for the last 2 years. As a result, there have been several days when ice formed on the interior door to the Fellowship Hall. The 2<sup>nd</sup> will replace the unit in the ladies' rear restroom. If they perform well the remaining

forced air units will be replaced as funds are available. Thank you, Joel Thomas.

- •Rear Entrance Automatic Door Lock The rear entrance door to Klaud's Pantry has not been working since late September. A 12-volt transformer which is integral to the circuit board failed. Due to the system's age, repair is unlikely. New systems are being investigated.
- •Sidewalk The sunken sidewalk slab on the east side of the Bell Tower has been raised to eliminate the trip hazard.
- •Parking Lot and Driveway Cracks All the open cracks in the paved surfaces have been sealed for winter.

November 1: All Saints Day First Lesson: Revelation 7:9-17 Second Lesson: 1 John 3:1-3 Holy Gospel: Matthew 5:1-12

**Introduction to the readings:** All Saints celebrates the baptized people of God, living and dead, who are the body of Christ. As November heralds the dying of the landscape in many northern regions, the readings and liturgy call us to remember all who have died in Christ and whose baptism is complete. At the Lord's table we gather with the faithful of every time and place, trusting that the promises of God will be fulfilled and that all tears will be wiped away in the new Jerusalem.

### **November 8: Twenty Third Sunday after Pentecost**

First Lesson: Amos 5:18-24

Second Lesson: 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18

Holy Gospel: Matthew 25:1-13

**Introduction to the readings**: Today the prophet Amos calls for justice to roll down like waters. Paul urges us to encourage one another with the promised coming of the Lord. Jesus tells the parable of the wise and foolish bridesmaids. Surrounded by the faithful of every time and place, we celebrate Christ's coming in our midst in the word of life and the feast of victory—the marriage feast of the lamb.

### **November 15: Twenty Fourth Sunday after Pentecost**

First Lesson: Zephaniah 1:7, 12-18 Second Lesson: 1 Thessalonians 5:1-11 Holy Gospel: Matthew 25:14-30

**Introduction to the readings:** Our readings during November speak of the end times. Zephaniah proclaims that the coming day of the LORD will be filled with wrath and distress. Paul says it will come like a thief in the night and urges us to be awake and sober. Jesus tells the parable of the talents, calling us to use our gifts, while we still have time, for the greater and common good. In a world filled with violence and despair, we gather around signs of hope—word, water, bread, and wine—eager to welcome the good news of Christ's coming among us.

First Lesson: Ezekiel 34:11-16, 20-24 Second Lesson:Ephesians 1:15-23 Holy Gospel: Matthew 25:31-46



Both cry out for an apparently distant, angry God to show up, to save, to restore. When we hear Jesus describing the coming of the Son of Man with stars falling from heaven, it can sound dire and horrible, not like anything we would ever hope for. But when we really look at the suffering of people God loves, we can share the hope that God would tear open the heavens and come.
