Before I launch, a reminder. The Gospel of Luke and Acts are related. Luke chronicles the life, ministry, death, and resurrection of Jesus. Acts continues the story in the life of the early church. The Story of God's Big Work in the World. Volume One. Volume Two.

There's a lot of drama that happens in the transition between Luke and Acts. Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem, his arrest, trial, torture, crucifixion, resurrection, and a collection of post-resurrection appearances to his disciples. Then he ascends. What next?

In the opening chapter of Acts, Jesus tells these followers simply to wait. There will be a Holy Spirit event. But in the meantime, wait. Jesus equips his followers with promises, not with schedules.

Here at Shepherd of the Bay, the council has committed to engaging the congregation in a process of planning that will help us discern who we are and what God is calling us to do. These are important questions of identity and purpose. There are perhaps no more important questions than to discern who we are and why we are here.

In our fast food, instant gratification culture, it is probably tempting to ask the questions and have an answer by the next business day. But the story in Acts makes it clear that this is not the way God works. The church is asked to wait. Waiting is a theme in the Psalms, in the prophets, indeed, in the entire Hebrew and Christian scriptures. The people of God are invited to step back from their need for efficiency and problem-solving to exercise a faith and trust in God's working on God's timeline.

Waiting often proves wise when people try to make sense of where and how God is accompanying them. Waiting reminds us of our dependence on God and the limitations of our own ability to see and know God. Waiting helps us to see that we are called to be a responsive community, a community that waits on God to initiate whatever it is that God is calling us to do.

There is a both/and quality to our waiting. There is an active part of it. We don't just sit around and contemplate the past and the future. While we wait, we engage in conversation with each other, we reflect about our past and present, and we pray. "They were constantly devoting themselves to prayers."

And we wait in patient expectation. We believe that anything is possible as we await the new realities that God is about to unleash on the church. This time of waiting trains us to be available and attentive to the immediate opportunities that God might place before us.

As followers of Jesus, we are responsive people, agile, ready to move out, to take action, people ready to respond to God's leading. We are not puppets, but agents of action whom God has called through the Spirit to do God's work in the world.

In this time of discernment, we wait; not because it's our only option, not because we need to figure everything out before we take a first step. No, we wait because we expect God to open up opportunities and new realities. And when God does that, according to God's promises, we know that we will be honored and privileged to be players in the grand work that God is doing in the world.

# FROM THE MUSIC

### Choir, Church, Community

As the season turns to summer and our friends continue to make their pilgrimage back to Door County, I am struck by the beauty of this time of reunion. We all, including those of us who have remained "home" for the winter, have experienced unique adventures, opportunities, challenges and sometimes disappointments while we were away from Shepherd of the Bay, but this time of coming together is far sweeter when we can share our life experiences with one another.

I believe that our church community is like a wonderful choir: everyone sings, but with unique voices and talents, celebrating the diversity of its members in order to create a beautiful sound together. It would be a shame if everyone were forced to sing the same part or compromise the unique quality of their voice in order to belong to the choir. We need basses, tenors, altos and sopranos to create a balanced and beautiful choral sound that is the hallmark of a good choir. The "sound" is found when the singers find common ground in the production of vocal sound, agreement on the formation of vowel sounds, cooperation in the dynamic and diction plan, and a spirit of listening to each other in order to attain a good balance in the choral community of so many distinct voices.

In a choir, the diversity of the human voice is celebrated and embraced. It would be a poor choir if "the sound" loses all of its unique properties in order to "blend" with each other. A choir becomes robust and vibrant because of these unique qualities, not despite them. Perhaps this is a good formula for our communal choir at Shepherd of the Bay, celebrating the diversity of our church members. We are not expected to sacrifice our uniqueness for the benefit of the church body, but like in a colorful tapestry, we are encouraged to add our special qualities to the varieties and textures of an amazing work of art ... the vibrant tapestry of a diverse church community.

Paul wrote in his letter to the church in Ephesus (Ephesians 4:4-6):

There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope of your calling, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is above all and through all and in all.

I love the simple message of the hymn, *Bind Us Together, Lord*. It speaks to the commitment of community as we focus on the true locus of our church – God in the form of Jesus Christ.

The gifts he gave were that some would be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers, to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ, until all of us come to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to maturity, to the measure of the full stature of Christ.

May we continue to strive to be *bound together in love* here in our church, in our community and in our hearts for the sake of the kingdom. Amen.

Ever since we served up spaghetti dinners in a drive-thru format last year, people have been asking for that <u>amazing spaghetti sauce</u>. When will you do it again? I didn't get enough last time-is there more? Okay! We're doing it again!

Saturday, July 24th, we will again present our drive-thru spaghetti dinner! You will also have an opportunity to buy the sauce by the quart.

WELCA has decided to embrace two of the organizations that the council announced during our annual meeting. As before, there is no fixed price- donations only. The two groups that will share the proceeds this time are HELP of Door County and STRIDE mental health for kids.

A little about these two groups: HELP addresses domestic violence, protecting victims and also helping to rehabilitate offenders. The church has made an office available to HELP staff for several years. Besides advocating and supporting victims, HELP conducts group sessions for offenders which help them understand the root causes of their behavior and how to avoid trouble in the future.

STRIDE was created a couple of years ago to respond to a growing need for counseling and mental health support in our schools. The initiative was launched by the United Way and is a collaboration between school staff, licensed psychologists, and United Way staff. It offers free help to kids during their school day such as one-on-one counseling and family counseling. Many behavior issues stem from mental health challenges, even in very young kids, and this program seeks to help kids get set to learn in a happy and safe environment.

WELCA is excited to support both of these very worthy programs, and we know you will be too! Please be generous, and we will see you at the drive-thru!

# **Building and Grounds Committee**

**Sanctuary AV System** – The Pastor recently approved the expenditure of \$338 for Camera Corner to modify the AV system to allow the Parking Lot FM transmitter to be plugged directly into the sanctuary system. This will eliminate the need for the Pastor to wear 2 microphones and the separate wired microphones used to support Parking Lot church. It should also enhance the sound quality of the broadcast. The quote from Camera Corner was accepted June 21st but has not yet scheduled the work.

We have been Live-streaming services for the last month now and welcome any and all feedback from those of you that have been watching. There have been a few minor issues where the camera man (me) may not have kept up with the service, but that's the fun of being "Live". Thank you, Carol Omernick, for linking the livestream to the church website every week.

An introduction and training meeting was held Wednesday, June 30 with new operators. We reviewed their responsibilities and got some hands-on time with the system. #### **Building Maintenance**

Klaud's Pantry – The 3 wall cabinets that used to hang on the wall in the Conference



Room have been put in the pantry closet to provide additional shelf space. A gently used full size refrigerator/freezer has been donated to Klaud's Pantry and has replaced the small refrigerator/freezer that had been used. I am a retired R.N.; having worked 1/2 of my career in the emergency room and the other half in a middle school. I enjoy music, reading, gardening, and travel.


Steve is a retired funeral

# **Lessons for July**

#### July 4: Sixth Sunday After Pentecost

First Lesson: Ezekiel 2:1-5

Second Lesson: 2 Corinthians 12:2-10

Holy Gospel: Mark 6:1-13

Introduction to the readings: Jesus does great deeds of power and gives his disciples authority over demons. Yet none of this power is unilateral; it all must be received by faith. Jesus asks his disciples to go out without money or supplies, so that they will be dependent on how others receive them. When we are sent from the assembly to witness and to heal, we are asked to be vulnerable, to be dependent on the reception of others. The Spirit always operates in the "between": between Jesus and his Abba, between Jesus and us, between you and me, between us and those to whom we are sent.

#### July 11: Seventh Sunday after Pentecost

First Lesson: Amos 7:7-15

Second Lesson: Ephesians 1:3-14 Holy Gospel: Mark 6:14-29

**Introduction to the readings:** When Amos reports his vision of God judging Israel for its mistreatment of the poor, he becomes a threat to the power of the priests and the king. John the Baptist also speaks truth to power, and Herod has him killed. In Herod's fear that Jesus is John returned from the dead, we may hear hope for the oppressed: all the prophets killed through the ages are alive in Jesus. We are called to witness to justice in company with them, and to proclaim God's saving love.

### July 18: Eighth Sunday after Pentecost

First Lesson: Jeremiah 23:1-6 Second Lesson: Ephesians 2:11-22 Holy Gospel: Mark 6:30-34, 53-56

**Introduction to the readings:** Mark's gospel makes clear how great is the press of the crowd, with its countless needs to be met, on Jesus and his disciples. Yet in today's gospel Jesus advises his disciples to get away and rest, to take care of themselves. Sometimes we think that when others are in great need we shouldn't think of ourselves at all; but Jesus also honors the caregivers' need. We are sent from Christ's table to care for others and for ourselves.

#### **July 25: Ninth Sunday after Pentecost**

First Lesson: 2 Kings 4:42-44 Second Lesson: Ephesians 3:14-21

Holy Gospel: John 6:1-21

**Introduction to the readings:** Today is the first of five Sundays with gospel readings from John 6, the first four of which focus on Jesus as bread of life. Today Jesus feeds thousands of people with five loaves and two fish. What we have, what we bring to Jesus' table, seems like it is not nearly enough to meet all the needs we see around us. But it is not the adequacy of our supplies or our skills that finally makes the difference: it is the power of Jesus working in the littlest and least to transform this world into the world God desires, a world where all the hungry are satisfied.

# Tuesday Morning Bible Study


Pastor Jim's Bible study will be held in person in the fellowship hall at church.
