Ash Wednesday is February 17

On Ash Wednesday we begin our forty-day journey toward Easter with a day of fasting and repentance. Marking our foreheads with dust, we acknowledge that we die and return to the earth. At the same time, the dust traces the lifegiving cross indelibly marked on our foreheads at baptism. While we journey through Lent to return to God, we have already been reconciled to God through Christ. We humbly pray for God to make our hearts clean while we rejoice that "now is the day of salvation." Returning to our baptismal call, we more intentionally bear the fruits of mercy and justice in the world. Ash Wednesday is a significant opportunity for reflection, devotion, and recommitting ourselves to the disciplines of the Christian faith.

Ash Wednesday will look a little different than usual this year. We have worked creatively, diligently, and prayerfully to provide unique opportunities for Ash Wednesday devotion.

We are preparing prayer cards that will have small plastic envelopes of ashes so that you can impose ashes in your home. The card will include instructions for the imposition of ashes. You can pick up the card with ashes at drive-in church on February 7 or 14. In addition, you may simply call or email the church office and request that the card and ashes be mailed to you. Please do so by February 10 to insure that they arrive in your mailbox by Ash Wednesday.

So, 3 different options for your Ash Wednesday devotion which can be used alone or in combination are:

- 1) Pray this brief rite on the card at a time convenient for you.
- 2) Go to our website, shepherdofthebay.org, to view an informal Ash Wednesday service. Pastor Jim will record a simple service from home with some readings and a sermon. the confession, and the imposition of ashes.
- 3) Our live Wednesday prayer service at 7:00pm on the Shepherd of the Bay FaceBook page will also observe Ash Wednesday with the imposition of ashes. It will have a few of the elements of the recorded service, but won't be as long.

We hope you will join us as we begin our Lenten journey together.

I've been interested and curious about the speculations or prognosticators who write about what the long-term effects of the global pandemic might be on what we used to think of as normal life. Those who write about business trends, for instance, suggest that even after life returns to some level of normalcy, many, many more people will continue to work remotely. A lot of people have discovered they can get their work done without having to go to the office every day. Smaller towns within in a few hours of New York City have experienced a meteoric rise in real estate activity after New Yorkers are fleeing the city, but keeping those city jobs. I wonder if something similar has happened in Door County? I've also noticed the trend in terms of conferences and seminars. One of the conferences I go to every year shortly after April has decided to do both the workshops and the plenary presentations on-line. Rather than travel to the conference, stay in a hotel room, eat meals in a restaurant, we are going to be able to participate from our own homes. The upside is that it saves a lot of money; the downside, of course, is that we won't be able to have the informal conversations at the lunch table or with a glass of beer in the evening. It makes me wonder what conferences will look like after the pandemic.

I've been thinking a lot about what church will look like after the pandemic. And of course, the short answer is, no one knows. What I do believe is that this will be a time for us to be agile, flexible, and creative.

I've also been thinking about the unexpected blessings of the past year, the signs of God at work among us. I continue to be astounded at the response to the drive-in church. On a cold Sunday in January (the 17th), we had 96 people attend. That's amazing! I'm so grateful. What's been striking to me is that our drive-in church is not only providing a valuable opportunity for our members to worship, but it has attracted a number of people from the community. Who would have expected that God would use this unusual way of worshiping as a significant outreach ministry?

While on-line worship is certainly not ideal, the unexpected blessing has been that our reach has gone far beyond Door County. Early in December, I got a phone call from a young man in northwestern Wisconsin. He reported that he loves our recorded service and watches it every week with his grandmother who lives in a Milwaukee suburb. I've gotten notes from coast to coast, from California to Washington, D.C., from people who regularly join us for our on-line worship, even in a few cases families who are scattered around the country who participate in our on-line worship together. Between the on-line worship and the drive-in church, we've actually experienced a significant increase in our average weekly worship attendance.

Another unexpected blessing has been the vibrancy of our weekly Tuesday morning bible class. While I don't keep attendance, there are between 20 and 25 people who regularly join us, though I don't think there's been any week when that many have participated at once. We have people who come in and out, and others who are there every week. I really didn't think that we could sustain an on-line bible study for very long, but each week, there is a great energy to our conversation about the lessons for the coming Sunday. What's great is that this, too, has become an opportunity for people to join us regardless of geography. Remember the young man and his grandmother who tune in to our worship? The grandmother, Donna, has been joining us each week from her home in Brookfield. Roy and Bunny Sheahan join us from their home in southern Wisconsin; Cal and Trish Pierson join us from Florida.

The pandemic has been the catalyst for the incredible growth of our food pantry. What began as a small operation with a few shelves in the alcove has grown to include perishable and frozen food, and now even some clothing, thanks to the Bombas sock company. And the generosity of our members and the larger community has been so touching, all of us working together to provide this support to our struggling neighbors.

I continue to be excited about how this ministry will unfold in the year to come. What's clear is that God is at work in us and through us. And we can be assured of that blessing as we move through 2021.

FROM THE MUSIC

February is an interesting month this year, something of a Yin and Yang event, dividing the twenty-eight days almost in equal halves. This short month marks the <u>end</u> of the beginning and the <u>beginning</u> of the end. Huh? Let me explain what I am pondering.

When we turn the calendar and enter the month of February, we continue the wonderful season of Epiphany, which is the natural conclusion to a season begun by Advent (a time of anticipation, pointing us toward the birth of Jesus, a new beginning of hope and promise). Epiphany follows (January 6) with the recognition of this special boy by the Magi and the season of Epiphany continues through the early life of our Savior, culminating with the Transfiguration of Our Lord, where Jesus was revealed to some of his disciples as God. I see this event as the end of the beginning.

And then comes February 17, Ash Wednesday, a day which turns our season of joy into a season of reflection, sacrifice, sorrow and penitence. The forty days that follow (not counting the Sundays) point us toward the ultimate sacrifice – Jesus' death on the cross and His glorious resurrection on Easter Sunday morning. Ash Wednesday could be seen as the beginning of the end.

But what an amazing journey this month contains! Jesus' early ministry demonstrates his divinity by His teaching, preaching and love for his brothers and sisters all around Him. Ash Wednesday marks a turning point and begins the time when Jesus challenges us all to reflect and repent and turn our lives around. He sees us! It is a time to set our eyes on our Savior, take His yoke upon us and learn from Him.

I think Georg Friedrich Handel set this thought beautifully in music, when he composed his masterpiece, MESSIAH, written in twenty-four days, in 1741. The singer's text, taken from Isaiah, is:

Then shall the eyes of the blind be opened, and the ears of the deaf unstopped. Then shall the lame man leap as an hart, and the tongue of the dumb shall sing.

He shall feed His flock like a shepherd, and He shall gather the lambs with His arm. And carry them in His bosom, and gently lead those that are with young.

Come unto Him, all ye that labour, Come unto Him, ye that are heavy laden, And He will give you rest.

Take His yoke upon you, and learn of Him, For He is meek and lowly of heart, And ye shall find rest unto your souls.

May this short month of February be a time of reflection and renewal for us all, challenging us to turn our eyes toward Jesus and follow Him.

Your Vote is your Voice

As members of Shepherd of the Bay, part of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, and Christians in the Lutheran traditions, we have long believed that part of our baptismal vocation is to be good, engaged citizens. Voting is one way we can contribute to the well-being of our neighbors and communities. The upcoming Spring Primary on February 16 includes candidates for State Superintendent of Public Education as well as judges and local government officials. Learn what is on your ballot and how to register to vote or how you can cast your ballot at myvote.wi.gov. You can also find nonpartisan information on the candidates at vote411.org/ballot. Important things to remember:

- You can register to vote at a designated early voting site, your municipal clerk's office, or your polling place on election day, so long as you have lived at your place of residence for at least 28 days by Election Day. Find your polling place at myvote.wi.gov.
- To register to vote you need to provide a Proof of Residence document. In addition to a valid State of Wisconsin driver license or state ID card with the voter's current address, other documents may be used. See a list of acceptable documents at: myvote.wi.gov/en-us/ProofofResidence.
- When you vote, you need to show a photo ID, such as a current Wisconsin Driver's License or State ID. For other options, visit <u>bringit.wi.gov</u>.
- You can find out about opportunities to vote early by calling your municipal clerk's office or visiting their website. myvote.wi.gov/en-US/MyMunicipalClerk

Waking Up White

On Thursday afternoons at 1:00, beginning on Thursday, March 4, Pr. Jim will be hosting a conversation on race, using the book Waking Up White, by Debby Irving. The book is an excellent introduction to some of the issues surrounding racial justice in the US.

In this book, Ms. Irving tells the story of her journey from white oblivion to white awareness, and tells it with such honesty and vulnerability that it becomes an inspiration to others. For 25 years, she sensed inexplicable racial tensions in her personal and professional relationships. As a colleague and neighbor, she worried about offending people she deeply wanted to befriend. As an arts administrator, she didn't understand why her diversity efforts lacked traction. As a teacher. she found her best efforts to reach out to students and families of color left her wondering what she was missing. Then it happened. The "Aha!" moment that launched an adventure of discovery and insight that drastically shifted her worldview and changed the trajectory of her life.

Our conversations will last 60-90 minutes, meeting each week for 9 weeks. You are welcome and encouraged to read the book prior to our first meeting on March 4. Please call the church office or email Pr. Jim to register. At least initially, our meetings will take place online via Zoom.

Building and Grounds Committee

Projects

•Interior LED Lights – The 31 lights ordered to finish the 2nd floor were received before Christmas. We started installing them Friday January 8th. After finishing the 1st Sunday School room with 6 new fixtures we discovered that they had a transformer "hum". We adjusted the "dip" switches that controlled the color and power (brightness) and found no effect on the "hum". We called the manufacturer's Technical Services and the distributer through whom we placed the order. They both agreed that they should not "hum". We stopped work, but unfortunately, we had removed 25 of the 31 fixtures and had installed 10 of the new fixtures before discovering the problem. The manufacturer forwarded some rework instructions explaining how to minimize the "hum" by isolating both the circuit board inside the fixture and the fixture within the T-track for the ceiling. We informed them that we were not in favor of reworking "new" fixtures for an issue that was already known to them. They said they did not want the fixtures returned and agreed not to charge us. Our distributer is looking for an alternative supplier.

•Sanctuary Dimmers – This project has been put on hold since March due to the COVID19 outbreak but was approved to move forward by the Council at their December meeting. Mainstage Theatrical Lighting from Milwaukee will be installing the new dimmer controls on February 4th and 5th. Their work will include 12 new dimmer modules, installation and programing.

Lawn Tractor – After the Committee's discussion in November they asked the Council to consider purchasing a new or slightly used tractor. The Council decided that the Committee should pursue a new tractor. Based on their direction the Committee sought quotes for John Deere and Kubota sub-compact utility tractors. Both brands are similar in size and capability. Both use 25HP 3-cylinder diesel engines, are 4WD, have factory installed front loaders, mid-mount PTO for mower decks, rear 3pt hitch and 540rpm rear PTO for powering various implements. The tractor will be used primarily for mowing and have a 60-inch mower deck. Unlike the current old Simplicity tractor, the new tractor will have additional capability to help ease the burden on the Garden Club members. The Committee is continuing to investigate while waiting for budget guidance from the Council

Insulation – The insulating work done last Spring above the kitchen has had a noticeable impact on the kitchen temperatures during the recent cold nights. While it has not yet been cold enough, long enough to determine whether the kitchen water pipe freezing issues have been solved the early indications are that that will be a thing of the past.

Building Maintenance

Interior Painting – The Choir Room, main stairway and Conference Room closet have been painted. Thank you, Karl Omernick, Scott Theis and Tim West. All the rooms on the 1st floor except for the rear entrance restrooms, Nurse's office and Parlor have been painted in the last 3 years.

Year End budget – While 2020 was definitely not a normal year the portion of the budget allocated to Buildings and Grounds ended \$19000 under budget. The 1st quarter of 2020 was normal with Sunday, Lent and Vespers services, and the new siding was being finished. The building was closed in April due to COVID, but electricity, heating and cooling continued. The investments in new siding, insulation, roofing and new LED lighting also contributed to the nearly \$11,000 reduction in electricity and fuel costs.

Focusing on re-opening the sanctuary. The Wisconsin Council of Churches hosted a webinar that offered some counsel about returning to in-person worship. They recommend not returning until 50% of the local population has received the vaccine and the positivity rate is lower than 10%. This will be a gradual process and in the meantime we are thankful for the continuing success of our drive up services.

Property and Grounds

Tom Tuttle has written an extensive report, thanking all who have funded various projects and those who have helped to maintain the building and grounds. He presented a list of 2020 Major Projects and 2020 Building Repairs as well as a list of 2021 projects, along with a list of Members Volunteers involvement.

Education and Youth

Lynda Pietruszka submitted her report on Children, Youth and Family Ministry.

New Business

Edee Madsen brought up the co-operation with Jane Wise from the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship in regards to Caring Bags with recipes for food pantrys. Heidi from Door of Life has donated space next to the Northern Grill (formerly Simple Solution ReSale) for storage of bulk snack items for food pantrys.

Bombas Socks has donated 2,500 pairs of Bombas ladies large black socks (knee highs) to Northern Door which will be included in the food pantry.

Mission Work – discussed forming a committee of former council members to work on this.

Old Business

Further discussion on re-opening the sanctuary. See Pastors report. Motion was made and seconded to approve all reports.

Les Keeperer closed with devotional prayer.

Lessons for February

February 7: Fifth Sunday after Epiphany

First Lesson: Isaiah 40:21-31

Second Lesson: 1 Corinthians 9:16-23

Holy Gospel:Mark 1:29-39

Introduction to the readings: In Isaiah the one God who sits above the earth and numbers the stars also strengthens the powerless. So in Jesus' healing work we see the hand of the creator God, lifting up the sick woman to health and service (diakonia). Like Simon's mother-in-law, we are lifted up and healed to serve. Following Jesus, we strengthen the powerless; like Jesus, we seek to renew our own strength in quiet times of prayer.

February 14: Transfiguration of Our Lord

First Lesson: 2 Kings 2:1-12

Second Lesson: 2 Corinthians 4:3-6

Holy Gospel: Mark 9:2-9

Introduction to the readings: The Sundays after Epiphany began with Jesus' baptism and end with three disciples' vision of his transfiguration. In Mark's story of Jesus' baptism, apparently only Jesus sees the Spirit descending and hears the words from heaven. But now Jesus' three closest friends hear the same words naming him God's Beloved. As believers, Paul writes, we are enabled to see the God-light in Jesus' face, because the same God who created light in the first place has shone in our hearts to give us that vision. The light of God's glory in Jesus has enlightened us through baptism and shines in us also for others to see.

February 21 :First Sunday in Lent

First Lesson: Genesis 9:8-17 Second Lesson: 1 Peter 3:18-22 Holy Gospel: Mark 1:9-15

Introduction to the readings: On Ash Wednesday the church began its journey toward baptismal immersion in the death and resurrection of Christ. This year, the Sundays in Lent lead us to focus on five covenants God makes in the Hebrew Scriptures and to use them as lenses through which to view baptism. First Peter connects the way God saved Noah's family in the flood with the way God saves us through the water of baptism. The baptismal covenant is made with us individually, but the new life we are given in baptism is for the sake of the whole world.

February 28: Second Sunday in Lent

First Lesson: Genesis 17:1-7, 15-16 Second Lesson: Romans 4:13-25 Holy Gospel: Mark 8:31-38

Introduction to the readings: The second covenant in this year's Lenten readings is the one made with Abraham and Sarah: God's promise to make them the ancestors of many, with whom God will remain in everlasting covenant. Paul says this promise comes to all who share Abraham's faith in the God who brings life into being where there was no life. We receive this baptismal promise of resurrection life in faith. Sarah and Abraham receive new names as a sign of the covenant, and we too get new identities in baptism, as we put on Christ.


