Thanks to you and your generosity in last fall's stewardship call, in 2020 our congregational will launch an expanded ministry of health and wellness. We expect to have a parish nurse on staff by fall.

But first, we have some groundwork to do. At the January Annual Congregational meeting, we plan to introduce to you our Wellness Ministry Task Force. It will be their call in the first 6 months of 2020 to define our Wellness Ministry. They will be talking to you, to other congregations that have thriving wellness ministries, and to the national Parish Nurse Association, working to insure we do all we can to set ourselves up for a successful launch of this new ministry.

Wellness includes, but is more than, nurturing or maintaining good physical health. Wellness is intertwined with a person's commitment to seek balance and well-being in the spiritual, physical, emotional, social, intellectual, vocational, and financial areas of our lives. As this new ministry unfolds, we dream of a ministry that will help people in our congregation and community to consider what wellness means in their own lives and to take steps to act with the help and support of others who care.

As Christians, we believe that caring for our health has a holistic spiritual dimension that encompasses the many dimensions of well-being.

Baptized in Christ Jesus, we are a new creation. God promises to walk with us daily in that new life. The apostle Paul encourages us to be of sound body, mind, and spirit – living lives of holiness that reflect our faith in Jesus and our commitment to serve others in his name. Holiness means staying close to God – keeping in touch with God through prayer, bible study, and worship, serving and caring for others, as well as caring for our bodies, minds, resources, and relationships so that we reflect God's love and faithfulness. When we do this we move toward life balance, well-being, and wholeness.

People look for wellness in lots of places: fitness clubs, medical clinics, drug or health food stores, self-help books and DVDs, TV programs, dating services, career counselors, mental health counselors, financial counselors – the list goes on and on. All offer to help people strengthen their bodies, minds, and social interactions based on the services they offer.

What we prayerfully hope to offer is a congregationally based approach to wellness that is different. It will be holistic and it will be designed to help all of us move toward wholeness by looking at all these aspects from the perspective of spiritual well-being first.

- When we have a shared faith and agree to learn together how to strengthen our wellbeing, we can support each other as we set goals and reinforce positive practices already in place, and as we work at changing habits that stand in the way.
- We are part of a community that knows God's love and lives and practices forgiveness.
 When we fall, we can encourage each other to try again.
- As we grow as individuals, we can enhance the life of our whole community, both our congregation and the larger community. We will develop and strengthen trusting relationships, and be further equipped for our service both inside our congregation and beyond our walls.

I'm excited for the launch of this new ministry. I will be praying for God's guidance and trust that you will as well. God grant us this good gift!

Building and Grounds Committee


If you have any concerns or suggestions regarding the building or grounds, please feel free to mention them to any of the Building and Grounds committee members, Eloise Lindem, Karl Omernick, Joel Thomas, Scott Theis or me. If none of us are around, drop a note in the message holder on the custodian's closet door in the narthex (the door between the 2 restrooms). Thank you for using the message holder and helping to identify things that need to be done.

Projects

Roof – Roofing will not be starting work until Spring or at least until the weather improves.

Siding - Note: Checkout the church website "What's New" page for more photos. Work has continued as weather has permitted. There have been 4 Holiday days and 6 days lost to weather as of December 27th. As of December 27th, approximately 970 man-hrs. have gone into the insulating and siding. Virtually all the work done

to date has been on the back side of the building with the exception of the south wall of the lady's back restroom. After completing the 3 walls around the Choir Room and restrooms work moved to the north office wall with 7 AC units. The Electricians disconnected the AC Units, but due to the age and expense to physically move them we decided that they would stay in place and that Boldt would need to work around them. Boldt estimated that working around these units would add an addition \$6000-7000 to the cost of the siding installation. As a result, work on that wall has stopped and moved past that area while we investigate other options. A significant amount of work has gone into covering






addition". After the old siding was removed the construction of the wall was revealed and has baffled everyone that has looked at it. For some unknown reason the cement block laid above the roofline follows the roof line. No-one from Boldt has ever seen a masonry wall constructed like that. Due to the way it was constructed the wall was not all in the same vertical plane. Looking at the north end of the wall outside the Music Director's Office, you could see that it angled toward the east. In the 3-4ft height above the roof the top of the wall was over 1-inch from vertical. The same was true when you looked at the south end of the wall from the sidewalk leading to the rear

entrance. Most of the metal furring strips were found loose, so they were all removed. Exterior treated plywood was used to sheath the entire wall, shimmed as

necessary and then covered with Tyvek. The wall is now straight and plumb. The large window wall on the east side of the sanctuary and the southeast wall into the corner with the stained-glass windows are complete. Working counterclockwise around the building they are now working on the north wall of the sanctuary. Up to

this point there have been no significant surprises until we got to the windows above the



Altar. There the Thermal Imaging indicated a significant heat loss and when we removed the siding and soffit covering, we discovered why. Large gaps between the masonry block walls and the wood window frames were found around the sides and bottoms of the high windows. In some spots light from inside the building could be seen. All those gaps were generously filled with 29.6 spray foam insulation. Another significant surprise was found when the soffit covering

over the angled windows was removed. No insulation was found over the windows. New fiberglass batt insulation was installed, then covered with rigid foam insulation on the outside that was tightly fitted around the wood roof purlins supporting the overhang.





The insulation from the inside was also checked but access to that area is very limited to just above the posts at the front of the Chancel. Fiberglass insulation was found on the 2 angled portions of the ceiling over the cross, but whether it continued to the windows could



not be determined. Outside, work continues on the north wall. Siding is complete on the wall outside the east Mechanical Room and Sacristy. Siding has begun on the wall behind the Altar. The wall behind the west Mechanical Room has been insulated with Tyvek installed and is ready for siding. Demolition has started on the NW inside corner walls by the well and organ bump out. The wall behind the organ will be done next as they continue to work around and into the alcove with the west stained-glass windows.

Building Maintenance

- •HVAC –East Sanctuary Furnace the water leaking from the condensate reservoir has been repaired.
- •Kitchen Large Coffee Marker The timer was found to be misadjusted and causing the over flow. It has been repaired.
- •AV System A Technician from Camera Corner came up to update the firmware in all 4 display monitors and software in the Matrix switcher for the video inputs. This should resolve the problem with the displays not working. A new wireless headset microphone was ordered an received to replace the broken one used by the Pastor.
- •Well We had a couple of instances where we had no water. Luckily, we found that the electric motor resets had tripped on the well pump. They were reset to restore water. The well service has been called to investigate.

Shepherd of the Bay Council Meeting December 16, 2019

Present: Pastor Honig, Scott Henry, Ron Hupe, George Cobb, Alicia Kropuenske, Scott Eckdahl, Lori Pothast, Edee Madsen & John Skogsbakken. Absent: Cheryl Becht & Les Keepper

Scott Henry called the meeting to order at 5:00pm

Alicia Kropuenske opened the meeting with a devotional.

George Cobb made a motion to accept the Agenda as amended, second by Scott Eckdahl. Motion carried.

We discussed the two articles from Alban Institute. The first reading was "What makes an institution trustworthy?" and the second was "What Churches can learn from Higher Education."

Scott Henry made a motion to approve the minutes from the November 18th, 2019 meeting. Second by George Cobb. Motion carried.

The Treasurer's report was presented by Ron Hupe. The regular offering for the month of November was down \$8,307 from the budget for the month but the YTD regular offering of \$375,993 is \$26,372 higher than 2018. Expenses were down for the month. A motion was made by John Skogsbakken to approve the Treasurer's report, second by George Cobb. Motion carried.

Committee Reports:

1. Pastor's Report: There are 5 couples that will be joining our Congregation. We will officially recognize them during one of our January services. Plans and preparations have been made for the busy Christmas season. A big thank you to John & Nora Zacek for their gift of a radio spot for Christmas. Each Christmas & Easter, they pay for a one-minute spot on one of the local radio stations that airs a brief devotion from Pastor and lists the times of our services. Pastor will be taking the Sunday after Christmas off along with some vacation time between Christmas and January 5th. Carol Hackbardt will be filling in during this time. 2.Building & Grounds report: Tom Tuttle reported that the roofing material has been delivered and is stacked at the east end of the parking lot. The roofer will not begin the work until Spring or at least until the weather improves. Tom continues to update on the specifics of the Siding project and the Thermal Imaging. The painting crew will begin painting the fellowship in January. The color will be the same as the Narthex. A question was asked about the library. Is it still being used? If not, is it due to the age of the material, availability of online material, lack of interest or something else? If the library is downsized, could it be moved to a more comfortable location?

A question also arose about the possibility of hanging a sign for the Vesper Service under our main sign. Currently, we are not looking to pursue this option due to the irregularity of the service.

1. Worship & Music: Their meeting was held on Wednesday, December 11th. They reviewed the worship calendar for the next few months. There will be a 4:00pm Family Service for Christmas Eve along with a Candlelight Service at 8:00pm. Ken Bergner will be stepping down from the Worship & Music Committee.

2. Education & Youth: Lynda Pietruszka reported that the Advent Workshop was a success. The December 15th Christmas Program was a great integration into the worship setting. The participation from the congregation with our kids created a "Church Family" environment. Wonderful Wednesdays have been brining in approximately 20 kids from Gibraltar. Lynda will be attending a conference in St. Paul in January to gather with other youth leaders.

A motion was made by Scott Eckdahl to accept the committee reports as presented. Second by Ron Hupe. Motion carried.

New Business:

- 1. Ron Hupe gave us an overview of the Budget Review process. After meeting with Scott Schultz, John Skogsbakken & Grace Rossman, the group will present the council with a 2020 budget to review and vote upon.
- 2. There was a \$2,360 benevolence from Home Missions, Bruce Foster Missions & Mission Giving Income. A motion was made by John Skogsbakken, second by Pastor Honig to gift the benevolence in the following way: Motion carried.

New Business continued:

- a. \$500.00 to Crossways Ministry
- b.\$500.00 to Door County Habitat for Humanity
- c.\$500.00 to Katie's Fund (Door County Medical Center Ministry Fund)
- d.\$500.00 to Northern Door Children's Center
- e.\$360.00 to Help of Door County
- 3. The United States Census asked for permission to put small yard signs along the Highway on Church Property. Motion made by Scott Eckdahl, second by John Skogsbakken to allow the signs. The vote passed 8 to 1 in favor of allowing the signs. Motion carried.
- 4. We had a short discussion about the Library and what the future holds for the library and its space. George was going to check with Sharon Cobb to see who is running the library. Further discussion will ensue.
- 5. Constitution follow up: John Skogsbakken wanted an update as to where we are with the new Constitution. It was decided that a meeting will be set up with John Skogsbakken, Greg Casperson & Pastor Honig. This will be tabled until the next meeting.

Old Business:

- 1. Parish Nurse: An initial committee is in the works to help define the Parish Nurse Program.
- 2.Discussion regarding the Major Repairs and Replacements will be tabled until next month. Pastor Honig, Les Keeper & John Skogsbakken will set up a meeting to discuss and bring recommendations to the Council.

We closed the meeting with the Lord's Prayer. The next meeting will be Monday, January 13th at 5:00pm.

Lessons for JANUARY

January 5: Epiphany of Our Lord

First Lesson: Isaiah 60:1-6 Second Lesson: Ephesians 3:1-12

Holy Gospel: Matthew 2:1-12

Introduction to the readings: The feast of Epiphany ("manifestation") concludes the Christmas season with a celebration of God's glory revealed in the person of Jesus Christ. In Isaiah and Ephesians, that glory is proclaimed for all nations and people. Like the light of the star that guided the magi to Jesus, the light of Christ reveals who we are: children of God who are claimed and washed in the waters of baptism. We are sent out to be beacons of the light of Christ, sharing the good news of God's love to all people.

January 12: Baptism of Our Lord

First Lesson: Isaiah 42:1-9 Second Lesson: Acts 10:34-43 Holy Gospel: Matthew 3:13-17

Introduction to the readings: In the waters of the Jordan, Jesus is revealed as the beloved Son of God. Through this great epiphany, Jesus fulfills all righteousness and becomes the servant of God who will bring forth justice and be a light to the nations. In the waters of baptism we too are washed by the Word, anointed by the Spirit, and named God's beloved children. Our baptismal mission is to proclaim good news to all who are oppressed or in need of God's healing.

January 19: Second Sunday after Epiphany

First Lesson: Isaiah 49:1-7

Second Lesson: 1 Corinthians 1:1-9

Holy Gospel: John 1:29-42

Introduction to the readings: Today's gospel opens with further reflection on Jesus' baptism. He is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world and the one anointed by the Spirit. In the liturgy we come and see Christ revealed among us in word and meal. We go forth to invite others to come and worship the Holy One and to receive the gifts of grace and peace made known among us.

January 26: Third Sunday after Epiphany

First Lesson: Isaiah 9:1-4

Second Lesson: 1 Corinthians 1:10-18 Holy Gospel: Matthew 4:12-23

Introduction to the readings: Jesus begins his public ministry by calling fishers to leave their nets and follow him. In Jesus the kingdom of God has come near. We who have walked in darkness have seen a great light. We see this light most profoundly in the cross—as God suffers with us and all who are oppressed by sickness, sin, or evil. Light dawns for us as we gather around the word, the font, and the holy table. We are then sent to share the good news that others may be "caught" in the net of God's grace and mercy.


