I thank my God every time I remember you, constantly praying with joy in every one of my prayers for all of you, because of your sharing in the gospel from the first day until now. And I am confident of this, that the one who began a good work among you will bring it to completion by the day of Jesus Christ.

First of all, dear church, my heart is full of gratitude. I am so thankful for all the ways that you are continuing to be the church during these difficult and challenging times. While we haven't been able to be together physically for worship, I keep getting cards and texts and emails telling me how you are joining in our services from all over Door County, and even from all over the country. I've even heard from some of you that you are worshipping together with family that lives far away as you tune into the service together across the miles.

I'm grateful to Lynda Pietruszka, our Director of Youth and Children's Ministry, and her small group of faithful volunteers who have done an amazing job of keeping families connected and providing them with resources to continue to teach the faith at home. Lynda organized a "parade" for our graduating seniors on Sunday afternoon and evening. We drove by their homes or places of employment with our signs and pompoms, honking all the while as our gifts and cards were given to the graduates.

I'm grateful for Tom Tuttle and Greg Beem and Lynda and Carol Omernick for their work in helping to record our services on Sunday. While none of us are professional producers, we have been able each week to provide you with resources to help you worship at home.

I'm grateful to our congregational leaders (the council) for their great efforts in keeping us connected with weekly phone calls. They will continue the phone calls, but monthly rather than weekly.

Of course, the question that everyone wants to know is when we will be back in the building worshipping together. It's something we all want and yearn for. Yet, the counsel we are getting from public health officials, from denominational offices, and from the Wisconsin Council of Churches is to proceed slowly and with great caution. (If you're interested in reading the documents yourself, you can find the ELCA document by going to the ELCA website <https://www.elca.org/publichealthand> click on "Resources for Returning to In-Person Worship." The Wisconsin Council of Churches document can be found at <https://www.wichurches.org/2020/05/20/return-to-church-resources/>). Based on the guidance offered in these documents, and from public health officials, we are attempting to align our plans with the three phases of the Badger Bounce Back plan offered by the Wisconsin State government in late April. We have entered Phase One.

It's also worth reminding ourselves that the "phased" approach presented in the Badger Bounce Back plan will likely not be linear; we will likely experience times of gradual reopening as rates of infection decrease, followed by restrictions if new waves of infections emerge. We have chosen to take a cautious approach that errs on the side of love for our neighbor. Change is going to be inevitable. Patience, grace, and flexibility will be necessary as we strive to make the most appropriate decisions for the people of God at Shepherd of the Bay.

Of course, we will continue to provide worship resources on-line. That will continue for the foreseeable future.

Knowing that outdoor worship is safer than indoor, in person worship, we are beginning an outdoor, drive-in worship service on June 14. You are invited to come to Shepherd of the Bay at 9:30 on Sunday mornings for our “Drive-In Summer Camp Service.” It will be a brief (30 minutes or less) service with prayers, readings, and a sermon. The service will be broadcast to your FM radio at the 99.1 or 89.9 frequency. We ask that the following guidelines be followed for our Drive-In Summer Camp Service:

- Only one household per car; members of differing households should not mix in the same car.
- It's important that everyone stay in their car.
- Since the service is so brief, plan to use the restroom before you leave home. The restrooms in the building will not be open for general use (only for emergencies).
- We will observe a measure of distancing between cars; park only in designated spots
- At least initially, there will be no bulletins. Instructions will be given through the service as we worship together in our cars. Singing will be informal and songs that you will likely know by heart.

Beginning on June 15, we will begin allowing groups of 10 or fewer to enter and use the building. We ask that the groups follow these guidelines.

- Anyone who wishes to use the building should call or email the church office so that we know and can plan for your being here.
- Anyone entering the building will sign in the log that is located at the main entrance to the building. (That should be the only entrance used at this time.)
- A hand sanitizer station will be at the entrance; please use it.
- You will be asked a set of questions about your general health.
- You will also be given a non-contact check of your temperature.
- All persons in the building must wear a mask. Bring your own, or we will have disposable masks available for you to use.
- Social distancing must be practiced, at least 6 feet between persons.
- If you feel sick, please stay home.

We have made detailed plans and have purchased additional equipment to insure that the building and surfaces are disinfected. However, any cleaning and disinfecting are by nature incomplete and imperfect. While we have made plans to clean and disinfect our restrooms, all restrooms used by the general public carry a higher risk than other public areas. Always keep in mind the level of risk that you are willing to incur.

These plans and guidelines have been developed with a great deal of prayer, research, and conversation. I want to thank our Re-opening Task Force, Lori Pothast, Judy Jackson, and Dr. Bill Meyer for their diligent work. Thanks also to Tom Tuttle and the Building and Grounds Committee for all the work they have done to help us prepare for cleaning and disinfecting the building. We have held all of you in prayer. We continue to pray for a spirit of discernment, for wisdom, and patience. We pray for researchers and medical professionals; for the planners; for the ill and recovering; for those grieving and struggling with the weightiness of these times. We pray for the watchers and wonderers, and all those who wait upon the Lord.

May the God the Creator who created this big wonderful world, God the Son who is both our Redemption and our Hope, and God the Spirit who continues to lead the church be with us and guide us.

It was back on March 14th when the Shepherd of the Bay Church Council decided to cancel services and other activities at our church. The decision was made to protect the health and safety of our congregation due to the increasing concern around the Coronavirus Pandemic. With in-person services no longer possible, the council wanted to make sure we kept in contact with all our members. The council did not want people to feel abandoned, to make sure they are doing fine, and to see if they needed any help. The church families were divided into 10 separate call lists. Each week, council members called the families on the list they were assigned. The lists were rotated amongst the members so that each week the families were contacted by a different council member.

It has been 10 weeks since we started the calls, so everyone was contacted by each council member. With reopening plans still being developed, we are reviewing how best to continue our calls. Many positive comments have been received for the calls, and for everything the church has been doing to keep us connected. If by chance we missed getting you on the lists, we apologize, and please let me know so we can get you added. If you would prefer to be removed from the call list, please let me know that too. 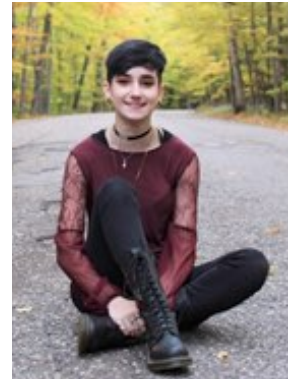

Thank you SOTB community for all the opportunities, memories, and support throughout the years! I will always consider this place my church home.

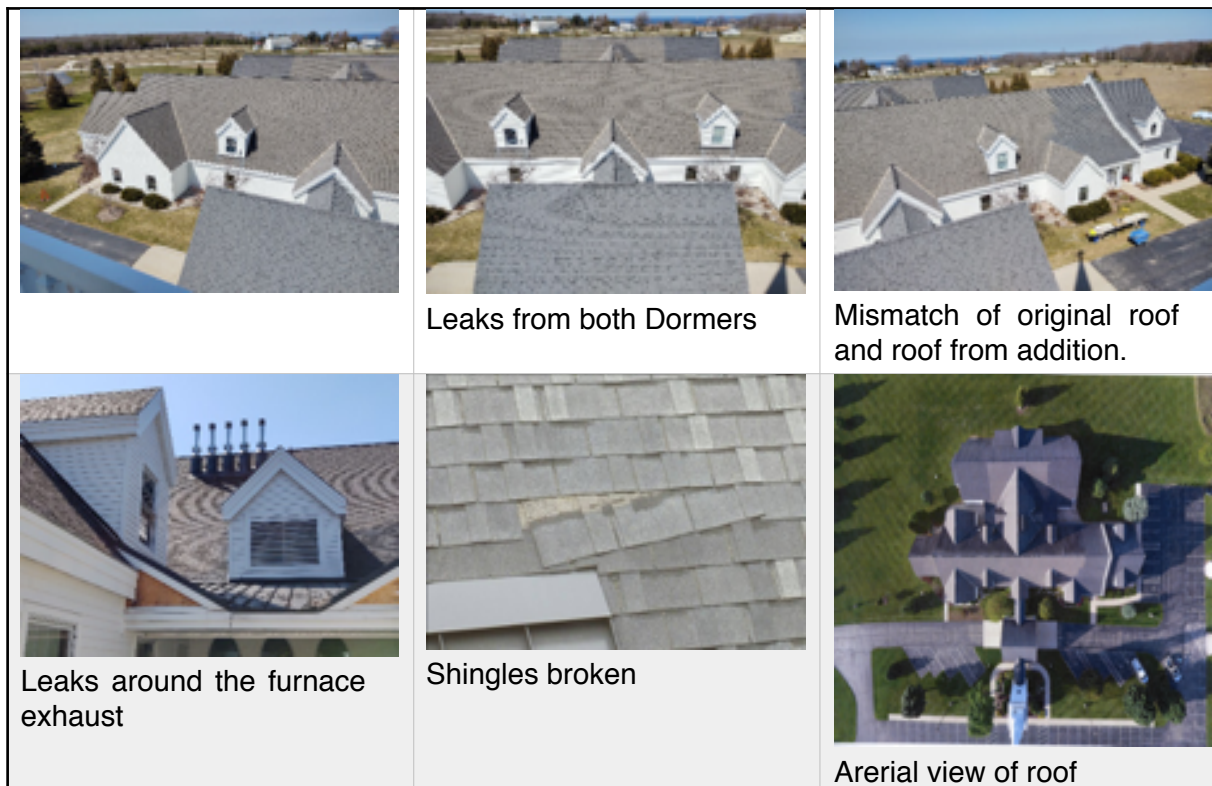

Building and Grounds Committee

Projects

•**Siding – Finished on May 13!** The new and stonework look great. In addition to the siding and exterior insulation work that was done, 3 rotten windows (church office, Nursery and the dormer above the Nursery) were replaced. The lower sash of a 4th window, on the left side of the main entrance, was broken during the work will be replaced when the new sash is received. A total of 3800 man-hrs. were required to complete the job. **Note:** *Checkout the church website “What’s New” for more photos.*



•**Interior LED Lights** – We didn't get the kitchen lights installed yet but will soon. There has been no new information from our supplier, so there will be some follow-up this month to get that activity restarted.

•**Exterior LED Lights** – Unfortunately there is nothing new to report on this project either, so there will be some follow-up this month to get that activity restarted also.

•**Sanctuary Dimmers** – This project has been put on hold due to the financial uncertainty of the COVID19 outbreak.

Building Maintenance

•**Cleaning** – We are taking advantage of the downtime to do some of the heavy cleaning. All the carpeting in the church will be steam cleaned. The 2nd floor was done April 20th. The Fellowship Hall, Narthex and Sanctuary, office hallway, Conference Rm and back entrance will be done next. The Kitchen, Nursery and Choir Room will also see significant cleaning. The window interiors were washed after Memorial Day. The exteriors will be done after the roofing is completed.

•**COVID19 Response** – Six new touchless hand sanitizing stations have been ordered and are expected to be delivered by the end of June. Availability of these stations and the sanitizer was arranged through a Door County partnership between FLS Banners, Hatch Distillery and the Paper Boy. The partnership's goal was to support as many Door County businesses as possible and secure orders for a minimum order of 500 dispenser stations at a reduced price. They exceeded their goal. The dispenser stations are being supplied by FLS Banners. Hatch Distillery will be supplying the sanitizer and the Paper Boy will be delivering. Look for the new free-standing dispensers when you return.

Garden Club – The lawn has been mowed several times already and is looking great, in spite of the wear and tear from the siding work all winter. A few spots have been reseeded and will be green soon after the rain and warm weather. The lilacs are starting to leaf out and will be in blossom soon. We are also looking forward to the return of all our members.

Zion Church Stained-Glass – I am looking for any historical information available about the circular stained-glass window that is above the Portico drive through. It was temporarily removed during the re-siding of the church after it was found to be sagging and barely held in place. A local artist will be cleaning it when his schedule permits and then it will be securely mounted back in the window above the drive through.

Lessons for June

June 7 : Holy Trinity

First Lesson: Genesis 1:1 - - 2:4a

Second Lesson: 2 Corinthians 13:11-13

Holy Gospel: Matthew 28:16-20

Introduction to the readings: Though the word trinity is not found in the scriptures, today's second reading includes the apostolic greeting that begins the liturgy: The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all. In the gospel Jesus sends his disciples forth to baptize in the name of the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit. More than a doctrine, the Trinity expresses the heart of our faith: we have experienced the God of creation made known in Jesus Christ and with us always through the Holy Spirit. We celebrate the mystery of the Holy Trinity in word and sacrament, as we profess the creed, and as we are sent into the world to bear witness to our faith.

June 14 : Second Sunday after Pentecost

First Lesson: Exodus 19:2-8a

Second Lesson: Romans 5:1-8

Holy Gospel: Matthew 9:35 - - 10:8

Introduction to the readings: Moses tells the Israelites that they are called to be a priestly kingdom and a holy people. Jesus sends out the disciples as laborers into the harvest. In baptism we too are anointed for ministry, sharing God's compassion with our needy world. From the Lord's table we go forth to proclaim the good news, to heal the sick, and to share our bread with the hungry.

June 21: Third Sunday after Pentecost

First Lesson: Jeremiah 20:7-13

Second Lesson: Romans 6:1b-11

Holy Gospel: Matthew 10:24-39

Introduction to the readings: God does not promise that the path of the disciple will be easy. Jeremiah feels the pain of rejection from those who do not want to hear what he has to say. Jesus declares that his words may bring stark division. Even so, we need not be afraid for God accounts for each hair on our heads. Though we may experience rejection, frustration, division, and death, God's grace and love make us a new creation each day. Marked with the cross and filled with holy food, we are sent from worship to witness to Christ in the world.

June 28 : Fourth Sunday after Pentecost

First Lesson: Jeremiah 28:5-9

Second Lesson: Romans 6:12-23

Holy Gospel: Matthew 10:40-42

Introduction to the readings: The welcome of baptism is for all God's children. This baptismal gift sets us free from the power of sin and death. In today's gospel, Christ promises that the disciple who gives a cup of cold water to the little ones serves Christ himself. From worship we are sent on our baptismal mission: to serve the little ones of this world and to be a sign of God's merciful welcome.

Shepherd of the Bay Zoom Council Meeting

June 1, 2020. 7:00 PM

Call to order 7:05 by President Scott Eckdahl

Present: Pastor Jim, Dick Burress, Sue Daubner, Scott Eckdahl, Ron Hupe, Cheryl Becht, Lester Keepper, George Cobb, Edee Madsen, Lori Pothast, Tim West

Open in prayer and devotion – Pastor Jim

Add items/ Approval of Agenda: Motion made to approve the Agenda by Tim West, Second by Sue Daubner. Passed

Treasurers Report: Ron Hupe

There has been a decrease in expenses relating to less activity at the church

There has been an increase in giving for the Samaritan Fund and Klaud's Pantry

Motion to accept the treasurers report by Cheryl Becht, second by Dick Burress. Passed

Committee Reports

1. Pastors report - put on back burner
2. Property and Grounds – Report emailed by Tom Tuttle
3. Worship and Music - will discuss under Re-opening Task Force Report
4. Education and Youth – Lynda Pietruszka reported on the Graduation Drive By, the Wonderful Wednesday kids paintings, discussed confirmation program, and outdoor worship space.
5. Fellowship - under re-opening plans

New Business

1. Re-opening Task Force Report - According to Pastor Jim, we are holding off on in sanctuary services until the end of June, watching carefully for spikes in Corona19 virus infections or a flattening out of the infected plateau which includes 14 days of steady or falling covid numbers.

We talked about the possibility of having a drive in service in place by June 14 and before communion is initiated. Discussed Sunday AM worship services, possibly allowing small groups in the building with safe practices. Bill Meyer expressed concern in the Task Force report that there will be a spike in mid June due to the premature opening of bars and loosening of the stay at home practice.

When SOTB does open it's doors, there will be temperature checks at the door, 10 people or less to start, and sanitizers and masks available among other safe guards.

The Task Force will meet again on June 10 to reassess. Pastor Jim will include the benchmarks we will be looking for in his letters to the congregation so they know what is happening.

Motion made by George Cobb to accept the Task Forces report, seconded by Edee Madsen

2. Phone tree calling - There was some expressed burn out voiced by the Council members as the season kicks in and we all are busier. Pastor Jim suggested that there are others in the congregation who may enjoy taking up the positions and holding the calls to once or twice a month rather than weekly. Passed.

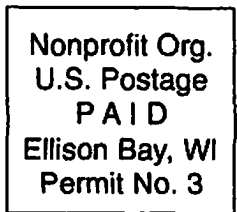
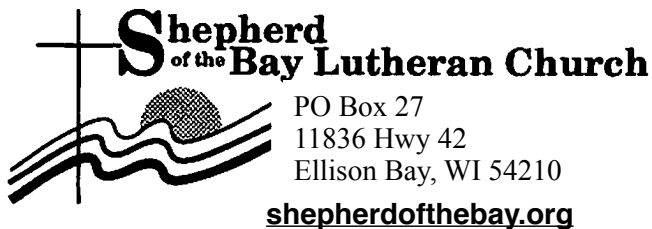
3. Klaud's Pantry update by Edee Madsen: SOTB has joined the coalition with United Way and 8 food pantries in Door County. Discussed enlarging our area to include a small refrigerator for milk and other dairy products.

Discussed whether or not a lock can be put on the hall doorway to restrict access to the sanctuary. A suggestion was made on having the food pantry in the bell tower entrance but it was decided that it would be too expensive to lock off the stairs. Motion made to accept Edee's report by Sue Daubner, second by Dick Burress. Passed.

4. Decision on Cleaning Proposals - 3 proposals were submitted by Tom Tuttle and a motion was made by Tim West to accept Proposal 1 and seconded by Les Keepper. Although the Proposal #1 had a significant initial investment, it was the most efficient and required the least outlay in the yearly operating budget. The motions were carried and passed.

6. Europe Lake Condominium Association wishes to use our church facilities in September for their yearly owners association meeting. We will give them approval contingent on the state of the Corona Virus situation and obtain a date from them as to when the final decision needs to be made.
