But those who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength, they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint. (Isaiah 40:31)

When I was on my internship in Alexandria, Virginia, the 1986 National Youth Gathering was held in Washington, D.C. I was the leader for our small youth group, taking them to the gathering; we didn't have to travel far. Up the Mount Vernon Highway, across the river, and we were there. Yet, that gathering is vivid in my mind, especially the theme, "On Eagle's Wings," taken from this passage in Isaiah. I'm not sure why it's so vivid among the many gatherings I have attended. Maybe because internship was such a wonderful experience for me; maybe because it was in Washington, D.C., a city I dearly love. Maybe the gathering was just that good. I can still remember the theme song for the gathering, again based on this lovely passage from Isaiah.

That image of a soaring eagle is so powerful and vivid. Once, shortly after we moved to Door County, I was driving back from Green Bay late in the afternoon, and a bald eagle swooped across the highway in front of me with a fish in its claws. What a regal bird, and what power and grace is embodied in that 7-foot wingspan. Maybe that's why I love that passage so much.

I also love it because of the promise.

I will confess that I'm not very good at waiting. And I can neither literally nor metaphorically run and not grow weary, walk and not grow faint. I confess that there have been long days in this time of pandemic, and times when I am weary, even exhausted from trying to figure out how to be pastor and how to be church in a time when so much of what we love to do together is just not possible right now.

Back to that promise. Though these are often challenging times, I do believe in God's promise to renew my strength, to renew your strength, and to renew the strength of the church. I have witnessed astonishing generosity, extraordinary love and care, and the bold imagination of so many of you. We have never stopped being the church; we have just moved it out of the building. Which is probably where it needs to be anyway! During 3 Sundays in June, our gospel lessons were from Matthew 10, the chapter where Jesus gives his disciples instructions just before he sends them out. He tells them that the "harvest is abundant, but the laborers are few; pray to the Lord of the harvest, therefore, that he may sent forth laborers into his harvest." I think about our mission in this time, of where and how God is at work and how we might be part of that grand mission.

I hope you will join me in praying for our congregation: in thanksgiving for all the blessings and all the ways we are doing that mission together, and also that God would lead us and guide us to be faithful laborers for that abundant harvest. It is for that work that our strength is renewed and we mount up with wings like eagles.

Stewardship Update

In these strange and unprecedented times, you are showing what it means to be faithful stewards. Last fall when we established goals and priorities for 2020, you made commitments that have allowed this ministry to flourish even in a time of physical isolation.

Here are some snapshots of what your giving is making possible:

- Cards and notes and emails through our website have poured in over the last few months with thanks for the worship opportunities you provide via our on-line services and now the drive-in worship:
- Your ministry reaches far beyond the Bays. I worship with you on Sunday morning from California. I am so grateful for. . .messages. . .that stir my heart and encourage my faith in the Lord, and to try to live in ways that honor Him.
- Thank you and all involved in the weekly services on the internet. They have been very meaningful and helpful to us in this time of isolation and disruption.
- A few have reported that they watch the services "together" with family members who live around the country.

The Health and Wellness Ministry Task Force is working on the launch of this new ministry and expects to have their work done by September. Task Force Chair Mark Glasser says, Five members of Shepherd of the Bay are engaged in developing the plan for establishing a Faith Community Nurse as part of our ongoing ministry. Connecting our physical health with our spiritual health seems more important than ever and the potential to provide meaningful help to people is inspiring. Because of the value this work can bring to our congregation, our plan is to get this ministry started yet this year.

As part of our commitment to ministry to children, youth, and families, we committed to making the director position full-time. In so many creative ways, our ministry with children and families have kept them connected to Shepherd of the Bay. From Facebook Sunday School, to delivering resources for parents to encourage faith formation at home, to a parade for the graduating seniors, this part of our ministry did not close down in the pandemic, but moved out of the building and has had a tremendous impact. Here's what we've heard from our families:

- •"I loved seeing you all in the (high school graduation) parade. Thank you for the quilt and the cards!"- Nina Sitte (one of nine graduating high school seniors)
- •"It meant so much for Gabriella and Vanessa and I to be a part of the Holy Week Journey."
- Kristin Demarinis (The girls acted out Jesus washing the Disciples feet on Face Book Family and Friends)

As we continue to evolve the ways in which we can be church in these times and as we slowly return to the building, your support has made possible the purchase of supplies and equipment to insure our safety. From the hardware needed for drive-in church to the tools needed for cleaning and disinfecting the building, we are ready.

Thank you for your generosity and support. Together we are the body of Christ, lifting our Voices in Praise and our Hands in Service.

Stephen Ministry

During this time of limited social contact, the Stephen Minister program has been continuing our mission but under much changed conditions. Due to our inability to see most of our Care Receivers in person we have been using telephone calls and text messaging to stay in contact. Although this is a less than ideal situation it is best that can be done at this time.

We understand that many of the needs in our church community and the Door County community at large are the same or even greater that they were before the start of COVID 19.

There is still fear of the unknown, stress over the unknown way COVID is communicated, which causes extreme anxiety for all along with the loss of many of our daily activities and the interaction with people.

He has brought down rulers from their thrones but has lifted up the humble.

He has filled the hungry with good things but has sent the rich away empty.

He has helped his servant Israel, remembering to be merciful to Abraham and his descendants forever, even as he said to our fathers.

May our souls continue to cry out with a joyful shout that the God of our hearts is great! And may our spirits ever sing of the wondrous things that God brings to the ones who wait.

In this time of uncertainty, we seem to be waiting, waiting, waiting. The psalmist encourages us to *Be still before the LORD and wait patiently for him*. Can we learn to be still and to be patient ... and to trust that God is aware of every hair on our heads and hears our every concern? Be patient, dear friends. God is in charge. Amen.


Projects

•Roof – Started May 26th and as of June 26th is almost finished. A 4-man crew has been working steadily and only lost a couple of days because of rain. The old roof is not being removed, because the weight of the new 75yr steel shingles is lighter than a 2nd layer of asphalt shingles. That savings allowed us to use the more expensive and longer life steel shingles. A nylon fabric is laid over the old shingles. It acts as a wear barrier between the old and new shingles so when the steel expands and contracts with temperature the old shingles don't wear holes in the new. The fabric also provides a water barrier should any water get under the new shingles. New bird wire will also be installed on all peaks to keep the seagulls off. The crew will be finished by July 1 provided they have good weather. Tells us what you think about our new look (siding & roof). **Note**: Checkout the church website "What's New" for more photos.

- •Interior LED Lights Joel Thomas and Tom Tuttle installed the new LED kitchen lights. Wow, it is bright and evenly lit! Especially when compared with the old lights where only half of the bulbs worked in some of the fixtures. A quote has been received for the balance of the fixtures needed to replace all the remaining lights on the 1st floor. The good news is that quote is low enough that it will allow us to include some, if not all the lights for the 2nd floor.
- •Exterior LED Lights Will be looking for a new supplier specializing in exterior lighting.
- •Sanctuary Dimmers This project has been put on hold due to the financial uncertainty of the COVID19 outbreak.

•Insulation – Home Energy Solutions was hired to come in and insulate 2 trouble areas of the church. The water pipes for the kitchen run across the top of the exterior wall behind the refrigerator and then down to the sink. That run across the top of the wall freezes when it gets down around zero. The other area is the nave at the back of the sanctuary where the recessed can lights above the last pew frost up, then drip in the winter. Both areas have now been addressed for less than \$4000. During the process we learned that a significant amount of the heating ducts for the sanctuary run through areas that are not insulated or not adequately insulated. I will be getting an estimate for the cost to address those problems and some others in the near future.

Building Maintenance

•Cleaning – The Choir Room floor has been stripped and re-waxed. The kitchen will be cleaned now that the new lights and insulation work is complete. A couple of stained ceiling tiles in the Nursery have been replaced now that the roof is finished above that area. A new Baby Changing station has been installed in the 2nd floor Sunday School restroom for the convenience of the moms bringing their babies to Little Lambs.

•COVID19 Response – Six new touchless hand sanitizing stations will be delivered before July 5th. They were ordered through a Door County partnership between FLS Banners, Hatch Distillery and the Paper Boy. Hatch Distillery will be supplying the sanitizer lotion. Look for the new free-standing dispensers at the front and back entrances, the entrance to the sanctuary and upstairs when you return. The Council also approved the purchase of an electrostatic disinfectant sprayer. The advantage of the electrostatic sprayer is that the very fine mist wraps around objects due to the electric charge. Ordinary sprayers just drop the mist on objects due to gravity. Due to the long led-time, I do not expect it to be delivered until mid-August.

•Klaud's Pantry – Now that Klaud's Pantry is part of the Door County Food Pantry coalition a proposal was made and approved by the Council to move the small refrigerator from the kitchen pantry closet to the rear entrance to serve Klaud's Pantry patrons. It has been placed next to the water fountain. Now the pantry will be able to offer refrigerated and frozen items. A small table has also been placed under the coat rack for fresh vegetables. A small bulletin board has been installed in the rear entrance vestibule so information for the pantry patrons can be posted.

Garden Club – Summer landscaping and mowing activity are going well. New volunteers are always welcome! Join the Garden Club on Thursday mornings from 8:30-10.

Poison Ivy Alert – the southeast corner of the property along Humbug Road is loaded with poison ivy. As a result, the walking path in that area is not being mowed. The Garden Club has started spraying to eradicate the problem, but it is going to take all summer. Signs will be posted.

Zion Church Stained-Glass – I am looking for any historical information available about the circular stained-glass window that is above the Portico drive through.

Youth & Family Ministry – Fire-pit – An area of the field at the east end of the parking lot has been cut down in preparation for a fire-pit and outdoor gathering area.

Before the pandemic, an enthusiastic and talented group met weekly at the church on summer Thursday mornings to knit and crochet hats, scarves, kid sweaters, and mittens. We delivered boxes of these beautiful creations to the Northern Door Childcare, the Boys and Girls Club in Sturgeon Bay, and made them available to the general public in public spots like libraries. You may recall seeing some of the finished work on the shelves in the back of the fellowship hall. Now the Thursday morning fellowship must be delayed, but the creating keeps happening. The knitters and crocheters are hard at work in their homes, and we will no doubt see some beautiful and clever work as a result! Thank you- we think this sends a great message about our church and congregation.

Fabric masks are a new and vitally important fashion statement, and a bunch of talented sewers are busy creating these. You may see some of these 156 masks available at the church once we can be together again.

And the quilting continues! There are three steps to the quilting process. First, pieces are assembled to create the quilt top, then the top, bottom, and batting must all be cut to a specific size, and finally, the quilt is assembled and bound around the edges by a group on winter Thursdays. Usually, the most time intensive work is making the quilt top, and our quilters have been hard at work making these tops at home. Before the pandemic hit, we had 128 finished quilts! These will probably be sent out in the fall, and we can track where they go. We have yet to hear about our quilts from last year, but we know that many of the Lutheran World Relief quilts have gone to far flung places- Peru, Tanzania, Jordan, to name a few.

On the WELCA calendar is our annual spaghetti dinner which usually takes place in July. It is still to be determined whether this will happen as scheduled or be delayed for a future date. But when it does, please remember that this is WELCA's biggest fundraiser and makes all of our local and international mission help possible. Now, more than ever, our support for the nonprofits that provide safety nets for people in crisis is vital.

In a time like this, our bond as a church family really shows, and it is a great comfort. Remember your mask when you go out, and stay safe. Thanks for reading!


Building and Grounds Report: Bird wire planned when roof is finished which should be in about 2 weeks.
