The Church Is at Its Best When Everyone Does Their Part

This past Sunday, I was excited to announce the launch of our Fall Stewardship Call, *Voices in Praise, Hands in Service*. I am as excited as I have ever been about an annual campaign. God has blessed us with a convergence of abundance that allows us to give generously to make a big ministry impact on Northern Door County.

Let me tell you what I mean:

- 1. The extraordinary generosity and commitment of one of our members means that we will not be coming to you to ask for gifts towards the significant building maintenance needs. One of our families has made a commitment to cover the capital costs of replacing our roof and siding. As it turns out, the roof may have been in worse shape than we thought. The contractor is feeling some urgency to get the roof replacement done this fall, concerned that trying to get through one more winter might cause interior damage.
- 2. I am inspired by that kind of generosity and commitment. When I see that example of such faithfulness and generosity, I want to do my part. Sheryl and I have talked about the kind of significant gift we would have made to such a capital campaign. We likely would have spread that over three years; we are now adding that amount to our regular Sunday morning offerings to support the ongoing ministry.
- 3. I really believe this is a rare opportunity that few congregations get to experience. Because the capital needs are taken care of, we can give our over and above offerings to strengthen and expand our existing ministry.
- 4. As if that generosity wasn't enough to inspire us, I have even more to tell. On August 25, I announced that another of our families, a family deeply committed to the vitality of our ministry, offered a matching gift of \$10,000 if we receive 150 Intention Cards (you may know them as Pledge Cards). This gift makes real the truth that every gift matters. If you can only plan for \$1 a week or \$5 a week or \$10 a week, you may think that in an offering of \$8000 a week, your gift doesn't matter. Now you know that it does. Making your intention helps us to secure this very generous gift that will help us towards our goal of increasing our weekly income by \$2000

Over the next few weeks, you'll be hearing specifics about our plans for the increase in weekly giving. You'll hear the stories and you'll hear about our vision for how the strength of our congregation will allow us to share the love of Christ with our members, our visitors, the northern Door community, and indeed around the world.

Please keep this campaign in your prayers, as I will be praying for you and for all of us, that the Spirit will lead us to a strong and generous response to this appeal.

Ministry to and with Our Elders. Part of the increase in giving is intended to fund the restoration of our Parish Nurse program. The data doesn't lie. Door County is the home of the oldest median age in the state of Wisconsin. We are a community that is skewed heavily towards the senior population. Rather than lament that fact, I celebrate it! We live in a community with and extraordinary storehouse of wisdom and experience. We have much to offer our community, our region, and the world.

There's a brand new book out there that I'd like you to read. The author is Louise Aronson, a geriatrician in medical practice in San Francisco and also on the faculty of The University of California Medical School in San Francisco. The book is called *Elderhood: Redefining Aging, Transforming Medicine, Life.* This book has fundamentally changed my understanding of this last third of life that we colloquially refer to as "Old People." Dr. Aronson takes a deep dive into what it means to grow old, physically, emotionally, culturally, socially, and economically. Much of the book is a critique of how we lump old people into one category, when the reality is the aging process unique, complicated, and can even be beautiful. She also offers her own vison for how we might do better in this last journey of life. It has prompted a lot reflection for how we as church might do better in doing ministry to and with our elders. I'm inviting you to spend the month of September reading this book. In October, we'll provide opportunities to gather for discussion about what it means for each of us, for our community, and for the ministry of our congregation. If you don't want to or are unable to purchase the book, we have purchased several copies that you may check out on loan.

Season of Creation. In the 1980's, Patriarch Bartholomew, world-wide head of the Orthodox Church, called Christians of all persuasions to awaken to our responsibility to be good stewards of creation. He issued a

regular series of encyclicals, called study conferences, and became the leading voice in urging Christians to care for the Earth. Now, almost 40 years later, the movement is gathering momentum, and there is a growing sense of urgency to answer the call to be good stewards of God's good creation. There is an ancient saying, *lex orandi, lex credendi*. Translated literally, it means "The law of prayer is the law of believing." What that means is that what we do in worship forms what we believe and how we live. With that in mind, a group of scholars and pastor 20 years ago or so, began to urge congregations to observe a specific season in the church year to focus on our call to care for creation. This is a growing movement in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, and one which our Presiding Bishop, Elizabeth Eaton, has encouraged congregations to observe. So, beginning on Sunday, September 29 and for a season of 4 Sundays, we will be observing the Season of Creation. The lessons, hymns, and prayers will invite us into the wonder of the good world God has made, and call us to be good stewards of those marvelous gifts.

We are on the move! There is much to celebrate in our ministry and much for which to be thankful. I'm grateful for all you do, for your prayers, your action, your service, and your love. What a gift to be in ministry together for the sake of the Gospel of Jesus.

Earth Care

Did you know that planting trees is one of the most effective acts of earth care we can do? Trees love inhaling CO2 and exhaling oxygen. They clean the air, reduce ozone layers and keep us healthy by helping to prevent asthma and other lung diseases. A mature tree can change 48 lbs. of carbon into oxygen and keep two people alive. Trees keep soil from eroding while also ensuring that roots can store needed water. A canopy keeps the roads cool and disperses heavy rainfall. In your yard, they will reduce both your heating and air conditioning costs. And they provide a balanced eco system for animals and insects to find homes and food.

Because of the value of trees, the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Ephraim and Climate Change Coalition of Door County are reaching out to our inter-faith community to add to Door County's inventory of trees. It is encouraging that 10 Northern Door churches have said "yes" to receiving and distributing 20 trees each. They have been procured through a grant to CCC DC and will be yours to take home and lovingly care for. You will be able to chose from tree species Balsam Fir, White or Red Pine, and White Spruce. You will receive a sheet of instructions for their care. Cal Pierson from our congregation along with a team member from the Environmental Justice Action Team of UUFDC will hand out the trees after the service on Sept. 15th. The earth thanks you for your participation.

The Help



The Buildings and Grounds Committee will resume our regular meetings in September.

Projects

•Roof and Siding - The Contractor is expected to send their roofing proposals Monday Aug 19th. They have indicated that they would like to do the roof yet this year. B&Gs will be reviewing the proposals and making a recommendation to the Council for approval. A thermal imaging scan is being proposed by the Contractor to be done sometime this winter to evaluate the buildings energy efficiency. The results of that test will help us evaluate whether adding insulation to the walls will payback in a reasonable amount of time. The siding will be done next year.

·Sanctuary New AV System -

•Available - the old sound system amplifiers and speakers are available for anyone interested. All the components are in working order. Contact Tom Tuttle.

Building Maintenance

- •Sanctuary Lighting The lighting over the Chancel and Alter was not replaced with LED bulbs last winter because of the dimmer controls. The plan was to use the old incandescent bulbs in that area until the dimmer issue was resolved. That changed when the last of the incandescent spot lights over the flowers burned out. The 2 spots over the flowers and the Alter have now been replaced with LED bulbs. The remaining Chancel lights have not yet been replaced. Comparing electric bills from last year to this year (Jan thru Aug) we have spent about \$1100 less this year due in part to the new LED lighting and the reduced outside lighting on the building.
- •Sanctuary Blower Fan Belt A fan belt was replaced several weeks ago on a blower unit located at the back of the church near the Choir Loft after it started squeaking.
- •**Kitchen Dishwasher** Sunday, Aug 18th during Coffee Hour we noticed water under the dishwasher. A quick check did not reveal the source of the problem. It will be investigated and resolved.
- •Fellowship Hall AC The AC unit supplying the Fellowship Hall lost refrigerant and was no longer cooling. This happened the week of the 25th Anniversary. The system was drained, then sealed and refilled. The AC is working normally now.

Garden Club -

•Stone Accents - Thank you for adding the stone accents to the flower beds around the steeple. They are an attractive addition. Some of the stone has been placed along the railings to keep the rain water from the roof from splashing mud up on the siding and railings.

Shepherd of the Bay Council Meeting August 19, 2019

Scott Eckdahl called the meeting to order at 5:00pm.

Present: Edee Madsen, Les Keepper, Lori Pothast, Pastor Honig, Alicia Kropuenske, George Cobb, John Skogsbakken, Cheryl Becht & Scott Eckdahl. Absent: Scott Henry & Ron Hupe.

George Cobb opened our meeting with a devotion on Psalm 23.

Approval of agenda with two additional items added was made by John Skogsbakken, second by Pastor Honig. Motion carried.

The Council spent a few minutes recalling memories of going back to school. We also spent some time discussing Chapter 7 Survive/Serve. We will read Chapter 8 Save/Sign for next months meeting.

The minutes from the July 22nd meeting were reviewed with a motion made by George Cobb to accept the minutes as presented, second by Cheryl Becht. Motion carried.

Ron Hupe, Treasurer was absent from the meeting but did send out an overview of the Treasurer's report from July. Envelope giving while a -7553 for the month is only -3429 YTD. This reflects many people paying their full year pledges early. There were no significant variances in expenses for the month. Alicia Kropuenske made a motion to accept the Treasurer's comments/report, second by George Cobb. Motion carried.

Committee Reports:

- 1. Pastor Honig has been busy working with the Stewardship for All Seasons committee (Scott Schultz, Les Keepper & Grace Rossman). Their work has been very much appreciated and they are starting to see the fruits of their labor. The congregation is responding positively to the Stewardship process.
 - Pastor has been invited to preach at the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Door County on March 22nd. The Council approved this request and we will look for a fill in Pastor for that Sunday.
- 2. Buildings & Grounds report: The roofing project will need to be completed this year as the contractor believes it is most beneficial to fix it before the snow comes. The siding project will be completed next year. The committee continues to keep Shepherd of the Bay Church in working order by completing many tasks around Church. Thank you for your hard work!

New Business:

- 1. Launch of the Fall Stewardship campaign= Temple talks and bulletin inserts will be happening over the next 4 weeks. September 9th the congregation will be given their donation intention cards. We would like to have these returned by September 15th.
- 2. Capital Repairs were discussed during the Building & Grounds report.
- **3**. Capital Fund Reserve was discussed with an agreement that Council will need to include a reserve fund in the 2020 budget.
- **4**. A motion was made to allow the community choir of Door County to use Shepherd of the Bay Church on Sunday, April 5th in the afternoon for their Living Last Supper presentation. The usage fee will be waived as our contribution for their fund raiser. If the Sound/AV system needs to be used, there would be a nominal charge. The motion was made by Alicia Kropuenske, second by John Skogsbakken. Motion carried.
- 5. Council approved the request to use Shepherd of the Bay Lutheran Church by the Scott Henry family. They would like to use the Church on October 27th for Evan Henry's Eagle Scout ceremony.

Old Business:

- 1. God's Work Our Hands= Volunteer opportunities with Scandia Village outdoor project and Adopt a Highway. Pastor will reach out to members to see if anyone needs help with small projects around their home and he will also reach out to Peninsula State Park.
- 2. Lynda Pietruszka, Youth Minister, will begin her work on September 1. The Education Team met last week to establish beginning dates for some of the programs. Sunday School will begin on September 15; confirmation and Wonderful Wednesday, the first Wednesday in October.

We closed the meeting with the Lord's Prayer and singing of the Doxology. The next meeting will be Monday, September 16th, 2019 at 5:00pm.

Introduction to the readings: Invited and inviting—that is the nature of the church. By God's grace in holy baptism we have a place at the banquet table of the Lord. When, by the power of that same Spirit, humility and mutual love continue among us, the church can be more inviting still.

September 8 : Thirteenth Sunday after Pentecost

First Lesson: Deuteronomy 30:15-20

Second Lesson: Philemon1-21 Holy Gospel: Luke 14:25-33

Introduction to the readings: Called to contemplate the cost of discipleship today, we might be helped by translating Paul's request to Philemon into our prayer of the day: Refresh my heart in Christ. Strengthened by the company and forgiveness of the Christ in the blessed sacrament and recalling God's grace in remembrance of baptism, we can be strengthened in this hour to "choose life"—to choose life in God as our own.

September 15: Fourteenth Sunday after Pentecost

First Lesson: Exodus 32:7-14 Second Lesson: 1 Timothy 1:12-17

Holy Gospel: Luke 15:1-10

Introduction to the readings: The grumbling of the Pharisees and the scribes in today's gospel is actually our holy hope: This Jesus welcomes sinners and eats with them. That our God wills to seek and to save the lost is not only a holy hope, it is our only hope. As Paul's first letter to Timothy reminds us, "The saying is sure and worthy of full acceptance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners." Thanks be to God.

September 22: Fifteenth Sunday after Pentecost

First Lesson: Amos 8:4-7

Second Lesson: 1 Timothy 2:1-7 Holy Gospel: Luke 16:1-13

Introduction to the readings: As we are invited today to consider what it means to be managers (rather than owners) of all that we have, it is crucial to recall that we are bought with a price. "Christ Jesus, himself human, . . . gave himself a ransom for all." Apart from the generosity of God we have nothing—we are nothing. By God's gracious favor we have everything we need.

September 29: Sixteenth Sunday after Pentecost

First Lesson: Amos 6:1a, 4-7 Second Lesson: 1 Timothy 6:6-19 Holy Gospel: Luke 16:19-31

Introduction to the readings: Consideration of and care for those in need (especially those "at our gate," visible to us, of whom we are aware) is an essential component of good stewardship. It is in the sharing of wealth that we avoid the snare of wealth. It is the one whom death could not hold—who comes to us risen from the dead—who can free us from the death grip of greed.


